"Advent" means "coming" or "arrival." During the season of Advent, we celebrate Christ's coming into the world and watch with expectant hope for his coming again. In its historical origins, the season of Advent was patterned after the season of Lent, a six-week period of penitence and preparation for Easter. Similarly, the four weeks of Advent present an opportunity for communal discernment and personal examination, as the church prepares to celebrate the Nativity of the Lord and looks with hope for Christ's return.

There's no such thing as "Advent" in the Bible, and there certainly isn't anything about lighting different colored candles. In the ancient world, however, various peoples lit fires to mark the turning of the light into winter's season and to pray for the return of the light. The church has Christianized that practice in the lighting of the Advent wreath. To us, these candles are signs of the growing light of Christ who is coming again in all fullness into the darkness of our world.

Until the dawning of that Great Day, we watch and wait in Holy Spirit for Christ's coming into the darkness • of our world, lighting candles of hope, peace, joy, and love; and

• remembering the promises of God with prayer.

Our Advent wreath consists of five unlit candles. Each successive week, we light an additional candle as follows:

- 1st Sunday: Hope
- 2nd Sunday: Peace
- 3rd Sunday: Joy
- 4th Sunday: Love

And on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, we light the fifth candle: the Christ Child Candle

In Advent we expectantly wait for the One who has already come. We anticipate the promised justice of God's new world ... we strive toward the restoration of the afflicted, the tormented, and the grieving ... we rededicate ourselves to the beating of swords into plowshares ... we pledge ourselves to bringing new life to the barren deserts of our cities. We rejoice that the Prince of Peace has appeared. We acclaim the child born to lead us into the promised land. We are renewed in Hope, Peace, Joy, Love and in the promise of the Christ Child whose birth we celebrate.<sup>1</sup>

The text of Handel's Messiah was written in 1742 by Charles Jennens, who used as his narrative specially chosen Old Testament and New Testament passages foretelling the birth and reign of Christ.

#### Messiah, A Sacred Oratorio (1742)

Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith your God. Speak ye comfortably to Jerusalem, and cry unto her, that her warfare is accomplished, that her iniquity is pardoned. The voice of him that crieth in the wilderness; prepare ye the way of the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God. (Isaiah 40: 1-3)

Ev'ry valley shall be exalted, and ev'ry mountain and hill made low; the crooked straight and the rough places plain. (Isaiah 40: 4)

And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together: for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it. (Isaiah 40: 5)

Thus saith the Lord, the Lord of hosts: Yet once a little while and I will shake the heavens and the earth, the sea and the dry land. And I will shake all nations; and the desire of all nations shall come. (Haggai 2: 6-7)

The Lord, whom ye seek, shall suddenly come to His temple, even the messenger of the Covenant, whom you delight in; behold, He shall come, saith the Lord of hosts. (Malachi 3: 1)

But who may abide the day of His coming, and who shall stand when He appeareth? For He is like a refiner's fire. (Malachi 3: 2)

And He shall purify the sons of Levi, that they may offer unto the Lord an offering in righteousness. (Malachi 3: 3)

Behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call His name Emmanuel, God with us. (Isaiah 7: 14; Matthew 1: 23)

O thou that tellest good tidings to Zion, get thee up into the high mountain. O thou that tellest good tidings to Jerusalem, lift up thy voice with strength; lift it up, be not afraid; say unto the cities of Judah, behold your god! (Isaiah 40: 9)

Arise, shine, for thy light is come, and the glory of the Lord is risen upon thee. (Isaiah 60: 1)

For behold, darkness shall cover the earth, and gross darkness the people; but the Lord shall arise upon thee, and His glory shall be seen upon thee. And the Gentiles shall come to thy light, and kings to the brightness of thy rising. (Isaiah 60: 2-3)

#### George Frideric Handel wrote the majority of his magnificent "Messiah" in just 24 days. Imagine what YOU can do in the 28 days of Advent to prepare your heart for Jesus!

The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light; and they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined. (Isaiah 9:2)

For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given, and the government shall be upon His shoulder; and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace. (Isaiah 9: 6)

There were shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flocks by night. And lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them, and they were sore afraid. (Luke 2: 8-9)

And the angel said unto them: "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord." (Luke 2: 10-11)

And suddenly there was with the angel, a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God, and saying: "Glory to God in the highest, and peace on earth, good will towards men." (Luke 2: 13-14)

Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion; shout, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, thy King cometh unto thee; He is the righteous Saviour, and He shall speak peace unto the heathen. (Zechariah 9: 9-10)

Then shall the eyes of the blind be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped. Then shall the lame man leap as an hart, and the tongue of the dumb shall sing. (Isaiah 35: 5-6)

He shall feed His flock like a shepherd; and He shall gather the lambs with His arm, and carry them in His bosom, and gently lead those that are with young. (Isaiah 40: 11)

Come unto Him, all ye that labour, come unto Him that are heavy laden, and He will give you rest. Take his yoke upon you, and learn of Him, for He is meek and lowly of heart, and ye shall find rest unto your souls. (Matthew 11: 28-29)

# God Speaking Through Us

I find it rather hard to witness the Good News to the people I meet. Most of the time I just forget or focus on the immediate issues in conversation or worry I might offend. Many verses exhort us to use actual words to let God's light shine out through us.

Though not being a preacher myself (though I know a very good one), I still feel called to witness to the faith God has given me. How can I do this? First, I'm still working on it! There are opportunities that come to me but sometimes I am not staying focused on Jesus and do not recognize them. The starting point for me is being open to the chances that come my way.

It may be as simple as responding using that scary word, "God," in a sentence. Breaking MY ice is usually my first step. If I get a positive response, if the person I am speaking to does not recoil in horror or immediately change the subject, I might have the courage to follow up and say something about what God has meant for my life.

Most of us have had at least one difficult period in our life when holding onto Jesus meant staying above water spiritually and perhaps keeping us from harm's way by poor decisions. If telling of your own hard times is too daunting, a less intimate comment can also be encouraging, such as expressing the wish "God be with you" or "God give you..." strength—or courage—or whatever need the person has expressed. Most people will respond positively to your stating you will pray for them.

I realize I have not used these or other statements to the extent that I might have to tell others of God's power and support in my life. But, perhaps like you, I do intend to do so more fully. Good intentions may not always flower to good deeds, but can certainly direct us to take the right road. Let us encourage one another to good deeds—telling of God's love and grace! Especially in this Advent season as we celebrate the coming of Christ, may our hearts be open to spreading the word. Keep open house; be generous with your lives. By opening up to others, you'll prompt people to open up with God, this generous Father in heaven. —Matthew 5:16

Seeing that Mary was about to give birth, I would guess that his wife helped clean out the manger, which is usually used as a trough to feed the animals, and maybe she put in strips of cloth that would be used for swaddling or wrapping up the baby to come.

We really don't know anything about the folks who gave shelter to Mary, Joseph and, eventually, their son Jesus. But we can believe that, even though these people were strangers to them, they gave the best they could—nothing fancy or great but just what they had.

During this time of year we are especially reminded to share with strangers the many blessings you and I have. Let's say "thank you" to God for all these wonderful gifts and to all the good people here who bring them to us to share.

# Seen On a Sign While Driving: "Jesus Had Two Fathers."

The two of us who spotted it had different interpretations.

"Of course He had two fathers: His father in heaven (God) and the earthly father (Joseph) who was chosen to nurture him."

"No, it's a statement supporting same-sex parents."

Marriage. Divorce. Step-parenting. Gay parenting. Topics that bring zest and charge to daily conversation. And become excuses to exclude and to hate. It seems impossible to achieve reconciliation.

But these issues are nowhere near as profound and earthshaking as Isaiah's centuries-ago declaration:

"Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel."

What more radical a thought can there-even today-be?

The signs, said Isaiah, were clear. Coming would be one who'd challenge and comfort a distressed world. Hear me, he cried, telling his listeners ... telling us still ... to be ready for change ... to expect the unexpected, and to embrace it. To not disavow the mysterious and heretofore unknown, but to try to understand it, and to strive for peace between all of our brothers and sisters.

But today's signs, we protest, point us in crisscross ways. What are we to believe?

And yet ... why are we worried? The child of God is coming, again, to open wary eyes and to strengthen weak hearts and minds. With Him, we again rise in courage to try new paths, or new ways of traveling the old.

With Him, we again are compelled to empty ourselves of frustration and anger, distrust and fear.

With him, again, we must prepare for miracles. We must look, and see.

But Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made. She came to him and asked, "Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to do the work by myself? Tell her to help me!"—Luke 10: 40

#### The Helper

Martha was focused on her "to do" list. Mary was fully aware of all that had to be done, but she put that aside to spend time with Jesus.

At Christmas time, it's all too easy to become a Martha, caught up in our long "to do" list. Too often, we start focusing on all we want to get done and start resenting that others don't help us.

Many hands may make the work lighter, but they won't solve the underlying problem.

What we need isn't more human help. What we need is more of Jesus. Only he can give us the peace of mind and heart that we crave.

At Christmas, we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ who came to bring us peace. But he won't force that peace on you—like Mary, you have to seek it out.

Take time this Christmas to sit a while at the manger. Contemplate what Jesus means to you, and listen to what he has to say. Take time to focus on him instead of on your chores and lists.

Chores are temporary. The peace you get from a relationship with Jesus is everlasting.

#### Prayers for Small Things

Recovery from a major illness or accident or bankruptcy or divorce can be made more rapidly and more surely with our focus on God. These problems may take a long time to sort out. However, our faith is often more strengthened by the little things that we put before God and see transformed nearly in front of our eyes.

How often do we pray for little things? Especially after a major life change I found myself praying more often and even for small wishes. The more I paid attention the more I was aware that God was fulfilling my requests, sometimes as I spoke and or in a short time—short enough that even with my brief attention span, I could see God at work in my life!

God cares for us in the little things. God never sleeps, is always within our call, and cares for us more than we can imagine, even bringing everyday blessing such as rain on the just and the unjust. Fortunately, he knows what we need even before we ask! He is ever ready to forgive, to instruct, to lead, to comfort. I go along much of the time forgetting that each breath is a gift; every good thing, a blessing from God.

Mindfulness is a popular subject in business and Buddhism. Being aware, raising one's consciousness, appreciating God and others, living more intentionally, and focusing our mind can show us more of how God loves us and keeps us focused. Jesus went away to quiet places to pray. In our busy world the quiet often may need to come from inside ourselves rather than in a lonely place—with the radio or TV off, the phone silenced, and us alone in our car or kitchen.

In the celebration of Christ's coming, clean out your worry list and put all the concerns, even the tiny ones, before God. I found I was amazed when doing this to find God always a step ahead and showering blessing on me, until, like counting sheep, I could not count any higher. Though I'm struggling to keep this up, each time I manage it, I am blessed again to see God at work in my life and in the lives of others. As we rejoice that God has come to us in Jesus, let us pray always—even for the little things. But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. —Luke 2:19

About the time Jesus was born, some wise men arrived in Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We have come to worship him."

A star appeared to them, guiding them to Bethlehem. It went ahead of them and stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they were filled with joy! They entered the house where the child and his mother, Mary, were, and they fell down before him and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasure chests and gave him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

(Close book) How many of you received gold, frankincense and myrrh when you were born? Me neither.

These stories tell me that, no matter what else you believe, the birth of the baby Jesus must have been a pretty extraordinary thing!

#### Remember the X

It turns out that the use of the word Xmas is not an attempt to "take Christ out of Christmas."

In fact, the word actually dates back to the earliest days of the Christian church. Early Greek Christians used the letter X (pronounced chi) as their symbol of faith, standing for the Greek word for Christ, Xristos (pronounced Christos). They marked their places of worship with an X, so it is one of the first symbols of the gospel message for people of all races and backgrounds.

During the early days, X was also the symbol of devotion and sacrifice. Christians often marked the spot where a true believer had given their life with an X.

The word Xmas first appeared in the writings of Catholic clerics and monks during the 16th century, when some clergy taught new converts that X was a symbol for Christ.

As time went on, Xmas was used to point out that Christ's death and resurrection were what gave real meaning to the Christian faith. The X in Xmas reminds believers of Christ's birth and of the cross.

In the mid-1800s, some retailers noticed that some Christian groups used Xmas and started using it to save print space and make their ads easier to read. But the term originated with the church, not with retailers.

The word Xmas can remind us of the complete Christian story, not just Christ's birth. And it can remind us of early Greek believers who could not worship freely and often paid for their faith with their lives. Yet they helped spread the gospel to the far corners of their world—and to ours, where we can freely use the word Xmas to share our faith with others.

Our Christmas tradition in Hong Kong was very different than America's. Trees were purchased on Christmas Eve. Tree trimming (with candles on it) and Christmas decorations were also made on Christmas Eve. A scrumptious dinner was served on Christmas Eve as well. Gifts (no toys, usually books and other meaningful items) were opened at midnight.

Caroling commenced after that. Our church youth group stayed up all night visiting and caroling the elderly members at their homes and they fed us all sorts of goodies. We would drag our tired bodies and full bellies home around 4 or 5 a.m. and would sleep until 1-3 p.m. on Christmas Day.

After we woke we would read the Christmas Biblical story and sing Christmas carols until evening. Christmas was a tremendously meaningful and sacred occasion to my family.

I really miss that spiritual fellowship. I pray that someday more people would spend their Christmas this way. Christmas season remains holy to me even today.

## 12 Days to Ponder

I have a mission to remind everyone that the Christmas season does not end on December 25. For centuries, the Christmas holidays didn't start until Christmas Eve and lasted until Epiphany, January 6. The "12 days of Christmas" referred to in the popular song are December 25 through January 5.

Many are unaware that the song has a religious meaning. When the Catholic faith was outlawed in 16th century England, clerics composed poems that would sound silly to outsiders but reminded believers of elements of their religion.

The "true love" in the song is code for God.

1st day: A partridge in a pear tree represents Jesus. A mother partridge will die to protect her young.

2nd day: 2 turtledoves - Old and New Testaments

3rd day: 3 French hens - faith, hope and love

4th day: 4 calling birds - the four Gospels

5th day: 5 gold rings - first five books of the New Testament

6th day: 6 geese a-laying – six days of creation when God "hatched" or formed the world

7th day: 7 swans a-swimming – seven gifts of the Holy Spirit: prophecy, ministry, teaching, exhortation, giving, leading and compassion

8th day: 8 maids a-milking – those who accept Christ's word and accept his grace. Milkmaid was about the worst job in England at the time this poem was written; this code conveyed that Jesus cared as much about servants as he did about those of royal blood.

9th day: 9 ladies dancing – the fruits of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

10th day: 10 lords a-leaping – 10 Commandments. (Lords were judges and in charge of the law)

11th day: 11 pipers piping – 11 disciples who carried out the gospel message after Judas betrayed Jesus and committed suicide

12th day: 12 drummers drumming: 12 points of doctrine in the Apostles' Creed.
